PRESIDENT'S CHALLENGE HAS RAISED MORE THAN \$13 MILLION IN SUPPORT OF 93 BENEFITTING AGENCIES THIS YEAR AND WILL CONTINUE ITS FOCUS ON EMPOWERMENT OF GROUPS IN NEED

- Key donors and volunteer partners were recognised at the President's Challenge
 2021 Appreciation Event
- The Empowering for Life Fund will be extended beyond its initial five-year tranche, following success in empowering service users with skills for employment

SINGAPORE 18 NOVEMBER 2021, 5PM – 77 organisations were lauded at this afternoon's President's Challenge (PC) Appreciation Event for their fundraising and volunteering efforts in support of PC benefitting agencies in 2021. President Halimah Yacob also announced the extension of the Empowering for Life Fund and PC's continued focus on providing customised and upstream support to empower groups in need to improve their circumstances in a sustainable manner.

- 2. Said President Halimah: "Empowering our service users with relevant skills and know-how, and helping them obtain and sustain employment will continue to be the focus of President's Challenge. This allows service users to achieve self-reliance and improved quality of life, and remain socially included in the long run. Over the past year, the generosity of PC's partners and the community has been critical in providing that pillar of support. Let us continue to work together to uplift communities and empower lives."
- 3. Despite ongoing restrictions to fundraising and volunteering activities arising from the COVID-19 pandemic, PC 2021 is on track to raise more than \$13 million to support 93 benefitting agencies and mobilise over 3,000 volunteers from 20 organisations by the end of the year. The annual Appreciation Event took on a hybrid format this year, with President Halimah interacting with representatives from top donor organisations, including Keppel Club,



Sheng Siong Group, and Stephen Riady Foundation at the Istana. Other guests tuned into the ceremony virtually.

- 4. An organisation recognised at the event was SingHealth, which rallied its group of healthcare institutions for donations through various fundraising initiatives throughout the year, by leveraging digital platforms such as e-donation pledge cards and online bazaars. These were in addition to its highlight event, the SingHealth Digital Baton Relay, where more than 450 staff participated in a safe-distanced 200km relay to commemorate 200 years of medicine in Singapore in conjunction with Singapore General Hospital (SGH)'s bicentennial. "Since 2004, the SingHealth family has come together as one to support the President's Challenge. Even as we continue to battle the pandemic, we remain committed to looking after the health and well-being of Singaporeans, doing our humble part for the communities in need in our midst," said Ms Mumtaj Ibrahim, Senior Manager, Communications, SGH.
- 5. To overcome restrictions to in-person volunteering activities, long-time PC volunteer partner Cognizant conducted virtual sing-along sessions and digital skilling workshops for seniors of various PC benefitting agencies, and taught them how to use basic functions of the virtual platform. "In support of PC2021's focus of building a digitally inclusive society, Cognizant aims to improve everyday life and increase community impact by supporting digital inclusion through our volunteering activities. In the long run, these digital skills can also empower those in need to keep up in a digital-first world," said Ms Rachel Boey, a volunteer with Cognizant.

Empowering for Life Fund to be extended in line with PC's continued focus on empowerment

6. Since 2018, empowerment has been the key focus of PC. In 2018, PC set a five-year fundraising target of \$10 million for the Empowering for Life Fund (ELF), with the intention of funding programmes to support groups in need in the areas of skills upgrading, capacity-building and employment, so that they can make sustained changes to their circumstances.



- 7. Thanks to the generosity of donors, PC managed to meet this fundraising target one year ahead of time. To date, with dollar-matching from the Government, more than \$21 million has been raised for ELF. ELF has committed more than \$10 million to 21 programmes that provide employment support catering to a variety of needs, and supported more than 1,400 service users on their journeys to sustained employment, including groups that had been underserved in the past, such as Persons with Disabilities (PWDs), those with mental health conditions and women. Many of the programmes were also effective in helping service users make sustained changes to their circumstances. For example, of those who received employment training, about three quarters managed to gain employment subsequently, with half staying employed beyond six months. Under ELF, some social service agencies also explored innovative design alternatives to the traditional employment support model, while several were funded in their maiden efforts to provide employment support.
- 8. An example of a programme supported under ELF is the Drive For Change programme by Pertapis Halfway House, which equips ex-drug offenders with driving skills so that they can find employment in the logistics industry. With the support of Drive For Change, 40-year-old Remy was able to obtain his Class 3 driving license. Motivated to upgrade himself, he later obtained his Class 4 driving license and a forklift license, and became eligible for more job opportunities. Remy currently works as a lorry driver and also holds a supervisory role in his company. He attends every graduation ceremony at Pertapis Halfway House with his wife and two sons, and encourages the current residents to motivate themselves in their recovery journeys.
- 9. Recognising that groups in need will continue to face multi-faceted and complex needs in the face of increased economic challenges, PC will extend ELF past its initial five-year tranche, so as to continue providing holistic support to those in need. Going forward, from 2022, social service agencies will be able to apply for support under ELF as part of the application process for PC funding. More information will be made available at a later date.



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About the President's Challenge

The President's Challenge is national movement led by the President to rally Singaporeans to build a caring and cohesive society together. An annual community outreach, President's Challenge aims to bring together people from all walks of life, under the President's patronage, to help those who are less fortunate. 100% of donations raised under President's Challenge go to beneficiary organisations supported by President's Challenge.

President's Challenge was established in 2000 by the late Mr S R Nathan as a fund raising campaign to help the less fortunate. In 2012, Dr Tony Tan expanded the Challenge to include Volunteerism and Social Enterprises. In 2018, President Halimah Yacob refocused the effort of President's Challenge towards the empowerment of vulnerable groups with skills and employability. An Empowering for Life Fund was set up to support programmes in skills upgrading, capacity building and employment of vulnerable groups. President's Challenge aims to raise \$10 million for the Empowering for Life Fund by 2022, and the Government will provide dollar-for-dollar matching.
